



Changes will give greater access to Primary Care services

From 1 December 2018, several changes will take place to provide New Zealanders with greater access to primary care. The changes are part of Budget 2018 and include: • Extending access to low-cost general practice visits for all Community Services Card (CSC) holders, including injuryrelated visits (ACC)

Extending CSC eligibility to all people receiving accommodation supplements or who are tenants in social housing Extending zero-fee general practice visits and exemption from the standard prescription co-payment charge (usually \$5 per item) on subsidised prescription items for children under the age of 14. This includes after-hours

Changes for Nurse Practitioners with Social Security Act 2018

New Social Security Act 2018 - Ministry of Social Development (MSD) The Social Security Act 2018 comes into effect on 26 November. It replaces the Social Security Act 1964. The new Act won't change the amount and conditions of people's benefits and entitlements.






